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Mark Weston Janis is William F. Starr Professor of Law and Director of International Legal Programs at the University of Connecticut School of Law. Born in Chicago in 1947, he grew up in Illinois and Michigan, and is a graduate of Princeton (A.B. 1969), Oxford (B.A. 1972) where he was a Rhodes scholar at The Queen's College, and Harvard (J.D. 1977). He served as a U.S. naval officer (1972-75), and practiced international corporate and financial law with Sullivan & Cromwell in New York and Paris (1977-80). He first joined the faculty at Connecticut in 1980. He was for four years (1993-97) a member of the law faculty of the University of Oxford in England where he was Reader in Law, Fellow of Exeter College, and Director of Graduate Legal Studies (Research Degrees). He remains a member of Oxford's Faculty of Law and is a Visiting Fellow at The Queen's College, Oxford. He has taught as a visiting professor on the law faculties of Cornell and UCLA, at the Universities of Paris and Aix-en-Provence in France, at Tilburg University in the Netherlands, and as a Fulbright Scholar at the Riga Graduate School of Law in Latvia. At Connecticut Law School, he teaches Public International Law, European Human Rights Law, and Constitutional Law. He is the author of three widely-adopted law school books: An Introduction to International Law (Aspen 5th edition 2008), Cases and Commentary on International Law with John Noyes (West 4th ed. 2011), and European Human Rights Law with Richard Kay and Anthony Bradley (Oxford University Press 3d edition 2008). He is the author of the intellectual histories, *The* American Tradition of International Law 1789-1914 (Oxford University Press 2004) and America and the Law of Nations 1776-1939 (Oxford University Press 2010), and of more than 50 articles concerning public and private international law. He is the editor of five scholarly volumes: Soviet Law and Economy with Olimpiad Ioffe (Martinus Nijhoff 1987), Religion and International Law with Carolyn Evans (Kluwer 2d edition 2004), International Courts for the Twenty-First Century (Martinus Nijhoff 1992), International Law Stories with John Noyes and Laura Dickinson (Foundation 2007), and *The Encyclopedia of Human Rights* with David Forsythe (Oxford University Press 2009). He has served from time to time as an officer of several organizations for the promotion of international law including the American Bar Association, the American Society of International Law, the American Association of Law Schools, and the International Law Association, and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations in New York.
