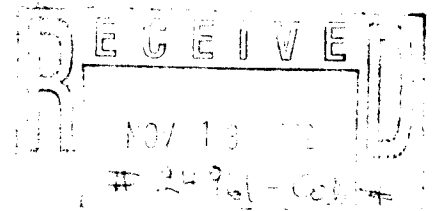
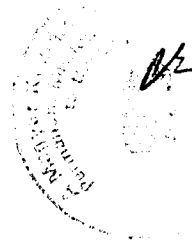

She possesses all the qualifications required in Hungary for appointment to the highest judicial offices. **Ms. Hajnalka Kárpáti** has an excellent legal knowledge and – as it is required to fulfil her present duties – fluent in English.

Taking into account that her qualifications are in line with the provisions outlined in subparagraph (i), paragraph 3. (b) of Article 36., **Ms. Kárpáti** has been chosen and is hereby nominated for inclusion in list "A" according to paragraph 5 of Article 36 of the Rome Statute,

Attached to this Note are Ms. Hajnalka Kárpáti's Curriculum Vitae and a statement submitted as set forth in paragraph 4 a) of Article 36 of the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court and paragraph 7 of the resolution of the Assembly of States Parties relating to the procedure for the nomination and election of judges, the Prosecutor and Deputy Prosecutors of the International Criminal Court.
