Proposal for an amendment submitted by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland concerning non-full-time judges

Non-full-time judges

Salaries, allowances and benefits

Judges who are not required to serve full-time at the Court shall be entitled to an annual allowance, payable monthly, of one third of the annual remuneration paid to a full-time judge, that is, one third of 180,000 euros or 60,000 euros provided that they have certified in writing to the President of the Court that either of the following is true:

- (a) Election to the Court has obliged him or her to relinquish his or her previous main employment on the grounds that such employment is incompatible with the status of a judge of the International Criminal Court as set out in article 40.2 of the Statute;
- (b) Continuation in his or her present main employment will provide a net income of less than the equivalent of 60,000 euros per annum.

All non-full-time judges shall receive:

- (a) A special allowance of 270 euros for each day that he or she is engaged on the business of the Court;
- (b) A subsistence allowance, at the applicable United Nations rate in euros, for each day that he or she attends meetings of the Court at the seat of the Court;
- (c) Travel to official meetings of the Court. All travel shall be by businessclass airfare between the home country and the seat of the Court by the most direct route.
