ARTICLE 93

TEXT OF ARTICLE 93

- 1. All Members of the United Nations are <u>ipso facto</u> parties to the Statute of the International Court of Justice.
- 2. A State which is not a Member of the United Nations may become a party to the Statute of the International Court of Justice on conditions to be determined in each case by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Security Council.

NOTE

- 1. By resolutions 1110 (XI), 1111 (XI), 1112 (XI), 1113 (XI), 1118 (XI), 1134 (XII) and 1325 (XIII), the General Assembly, having received the favourable recommendation of the Security Council in each case, admitted the following States to membership in the United Nations: Sudan, Morocco, Tunisia, Japan, Ghana, Federation of Malaya and Guinea. In accordance with Article 93, paragraph 1, these Members became <u>ipso</u> <u>facto</u> parties to the Statute of the International Court of Justice.
- 2. During the period under review, no State which was not a Member of the United Nations became a party to the Statute of the Court in accordance with Article 93, paragraph 2.
