

**MR. GUY S. GOODWIN-GILL**

*Emeritus Fellow, All Souls College, Oxford*

Guy S. Goodwin Gill is Emeritus Fellow of All Souls College, Oxford and Emeritus Professor of International Refugee Law in the University of Oxford. He was formerly Professor of Asylum Law at the University of Amsterdam, and served as a Legal Adviser in the Office of United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in various countries from 1976-1988. From 2008-2011, he was Visiting Professor at the Académie de droit international humanitaire et de droits humains in Geneva, and in 2010 he held the Ganshof van der Meersch Chair at the Université libre de Bruxelles, was Director of the Centre for Research and Studies at the Hague Academy of International Law, and Julius Stone Visiting Fellow in the Faculty of Law, University of New South Wales, Sydney, Australia. He has been a Patron of AsylumAid, a United Kingdom NGO, since 2008, was a member of the Council of the Overseas Development Institute (ODI) from 2007-2013, was President of Refugee and Migrant Justice (formerly the Refugee Legal Centre, a UK non-governmental organization providing legal advice and representation to refugees and asylum seekers) from 1997-2010, and President of the Media Appeals Board of Kosovo from 2000–2003. He is the Founding Editor of the *International Journal of Refugee Law* (Oxford University Press) and was Editor-in-Chief from 1989-2001.

Professor Goodwin-Gill has written extensively on refugees, migration, citizenship, statelessness, elections, and child soldiers. Professor Goodwin-Gill is also a Barrister and practises from Blackstone Chambers, London, in public international law generally, and in human rights, statelessness and refugee law. He has represented UNHCR on a number of occasions, including in the House of Lords in *R (European Roma Rights Centre) v. Immigration Officer at Prague Airport* [2005] 2 AC 1 [2004] UKHL 55; and in the Court of Appeal in *El-Ali v Secretary of State for the Home Department* [2003] 1 WLR 95, [2002] EWCA Civ 1103; and *R (Al Rawi and others) v. Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs and another* [2007] 2 WLR 1219, [2006] EWCA Civ 1279. Other recent cases in which he has acted or been a member of the legal team, include *R (Al Saadoon) v. Secretary of State for the Department of Defence* [2008] EWHC 3098 (Admin); [2009] EWCA Civ 7; Application No. 61498/08, European Court of Human Rights, Admissibility, 30 June 2009; Merits, 2 March 2010 (the extraterritorial application of human rights obligations); *RB (Algeria) v. Secretary of State for the Home Department* [2009] UKHL 10; [2009] 2 WLR 512 (‘withdrawal’ of refugee status); *DD (Afghanistan) v Secretary of State for the Home Department* [2012] UKSC 54 (exclusion from refugee status); and *Secretary of State for the Home Department v Al-Jedda* [2013] UKSC 62 (deprivation of citizenship and statelessness).
