Nicholas Tsagourias is Professor of International Law at the University of Sheffield. He studied law at the Universities of Thessaloniki (Greece), Bristol and Nottingham (the United Kingdom). His research in international law focuses on the law regulating the use of force, international humanitarian law, international criminal law, the law of state responsibility and in particular the application of international law to cyberspace. He is well published in these areas. Over the years, Professor Tsagourias held various visiting positions, the most recent at the Paris School of International Affairs, Sciences Po, Paris (France).
