

**MR. WANG GUIGUO**

*Dean and Professor of Chinese and Comparative Law,  
City University of Hong Kong*

WANG Guiguo is Dean and Professor (Chair) of Chinese and Comparative Law, City University of Hong Kong.

Professor Wang, holder of the JSD degree from Yale Law School and LL.M. degree from Columbia Law School, is the first Chinese recipient of the United Nations Institute for Training and Research fellowship which enabled him to study at the International Court of Justice, The Hague Academy of International Law, Office of Legal Affairs of the United Nations and Legal Department of the World Bank. Professor Wang was also the first person from the mainland of China to obtain the JSD degree from Yale Law School since 1949.

During the time as a JSD student at Yale Law School, and after graduation, Professor Wang worked in the law offices of the Simpson Thacher & Bartlett, New York, O'Melveny & Myers, Washington, DC and Los Angeles, Paul, Hastings, Janofsky & Walker, Los Angeles, U.S.A and Johnson Stokes & Master, Hong Kong.

Professor Wang has published more than 100 journal articles and book chapters in both Chinese and English. Professor Wang has also published a number of books. His *International Trade Order* (1987) published by Law Press is one of the earliest treatises dealing with GATT issues in China. Professor Wang is Chairman of the Hong Kong WTO Research Institute, an Honorary Advisor to the Ombudsman of Hong Kong, Adjudicator of the Immigration Tribunal of Hong Kong, Member of the International Academy of Comparative Law and Country Advisor to LexisNexis Butterworths Asia. He also served as a member of the Committee on Mainland Affairs of the Law Society of Hong Kong.

Professor Wang is a Distinguished Professor of Law at Hunan Normal University School of Law, Changsha, China, Vice President of the Chinese Society of International Economic Law and Advisor to the Shenzhen Municipality on WTO affairs.

Professor Wang is an arbitrator of China International Economic and Trade Arbitration Commission, Beijing Arbitration Commission and Hong Kong International Arbitration Centre. As an arbitrator for 20 years, Professor Wang has conducted numerous arbitrations under the rules of China International Economic and Trade Arbitration Commission, Hong Kong International Arbitration Centre and International Chamber of Commerce.

Professor Wang has often been invited to speak and give keynote addresses at international conferences on academic and arbitration issues. Professor Wang has also been requested by the world renowned The Hague Academy of International Law to offer lectures for their summer programme in 2010. Professor Wang is one of the very few academics from the Asia Pacific region who have been invited to deliver these prestigious lectures.
