



INTERNATIONAL LAW FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME



**The Hague, the Netherlands
5 July to 13 August 2010**

GENERAL INFORMATION

The United Nations International Law Fellowship Programme is conducted under the United Nations Programme of Assistance in the teaching, study, dissemination and wider appreciation of international law, established by General Assembly resolution 2099 (XX) of 20 December 1965. The Fellowship Programme is organized by the Codification Division of the United Nations Office of Legal Affairs.

OBJECTIVES

The Fellowship Programme provides high-quality training by leading scholars and practitioners from different regions and legal systems on a broad range of core subjects of international law. In addition, the interactive nature of the training allows the participants to share experiences and exchange ideas, which promotes greater understanding and cooperation on legal matters.

The Fellowship Programme is intended to enable qualified professionals, in particular government officials and teachers of international law, from developing countries and countries with emerging economies, to deepen their knowledge of international law and of the legal work of the United Nations and its associated bodies.

COURSE CONTENT

The Fellowship Programme consisted of lectures at The Hague Academy of International Law (Public International Law), seminars organized by the Codification Division, and study visits.

The seminars for the 2010 Fellowship Programme included: "Competences of the State in international law" (M. Kohen, Professor, Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, Geneva); "Treaty law" (O. Corten, Professor, Université libre de Bruxelles, Brussels); "International settlement of disputes" (M. Bennouna, Judge, International Court of Justice); "International humanitarian law" (T. De Saint Maurice, International Committee of the Red Cross); "Law of the sea" (J.-P. Cot, Judge, International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea and Emeritus Professor, University of Paris-I); "The international protection of human rights" (W. Schabas, Professor, National

University of Ireland and Director of the Irish Centre for Human Rights); "International criminal law" (R. Maison, Professor, University of Paris 11 — Sud); "International environmental law" (L. Boisson de Chazournes, Professor, University of Geneva); and "International trade law" (H. Ruiz-Fabri, Professor, University of Paris 1 — Panthéon-Sorbonne and Director of the Institute of Comparative Studies of Paris). The fellows also attended seminars on the "Relationship between international law and domestic law" and "The work of the International Law Commission" (P. Bodeau-Livinec, Legal Officer, Codification Division, Office of Legal Affairs) and "Researching international law" (H. Dreifeldt Lainé, Legal Officer, Codification Division, Office of Legal Affairs).

Study visits were organized to the International Court of Justice, the Permanent Court of Arbitration, the International Criminal Court and the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.

METHODOLOGY AND TRAINING MATERIAL

The Fellowship Programme was conducted in the form of interactive seminars and discussions to allow a maximum exchange of views. A comprehensive set of training materials was provided for each participant at the beginning of the Fellowship Programme. Certificates were awarded to those participants who had completed the Fellowship Programme in its entirety.

PARTICIPATION/QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS

Candidates for the Fellowship Programme were between 24 and 40 years of age at the beginning of the Fellowship Programme. They were law graduates with practical experience in the field of international law acquired by working for a public or private organization or a university.

The 19 fellowship participants who attended the Fellowship Programme came from the following countries: Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Chile, Comoros, Congo, Côte d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ecuador, Indonesia, Namibia, Niger, Qatar, Russian Federation, Senegal, Sudan, Togo, Ukraine and Viet Nam. In addition, two self-funded participants were selected from Australia and the Czech Republic.

VENUE AND COURSE LANGUAGE

The Fellowship Programme was held at the Peace Palace in The Hague, the Netherlands, from 5 July to 13 August 2010. It was conducted in French.
